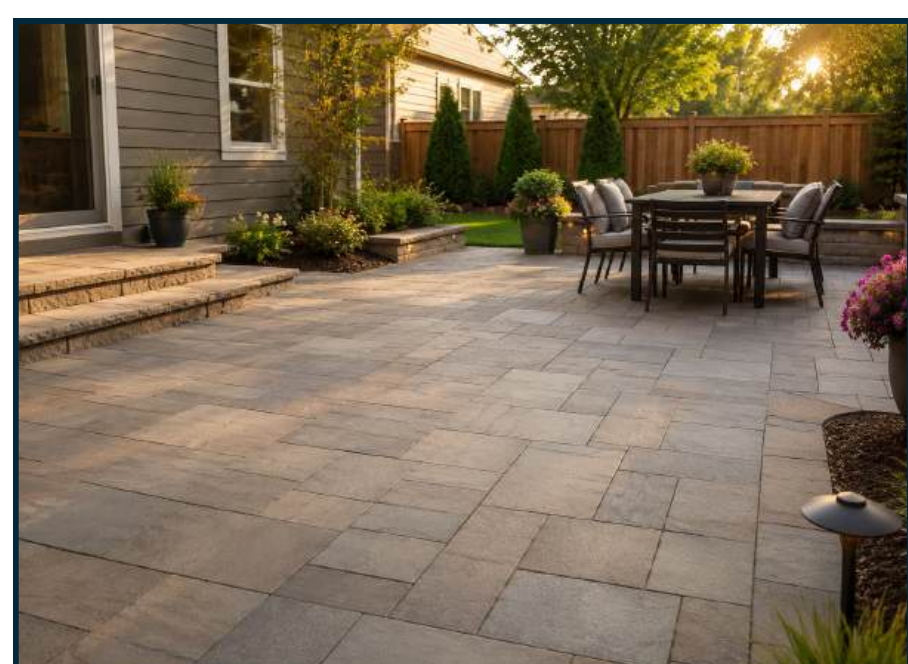


2. It Lets You Fix Any Drainage Issues

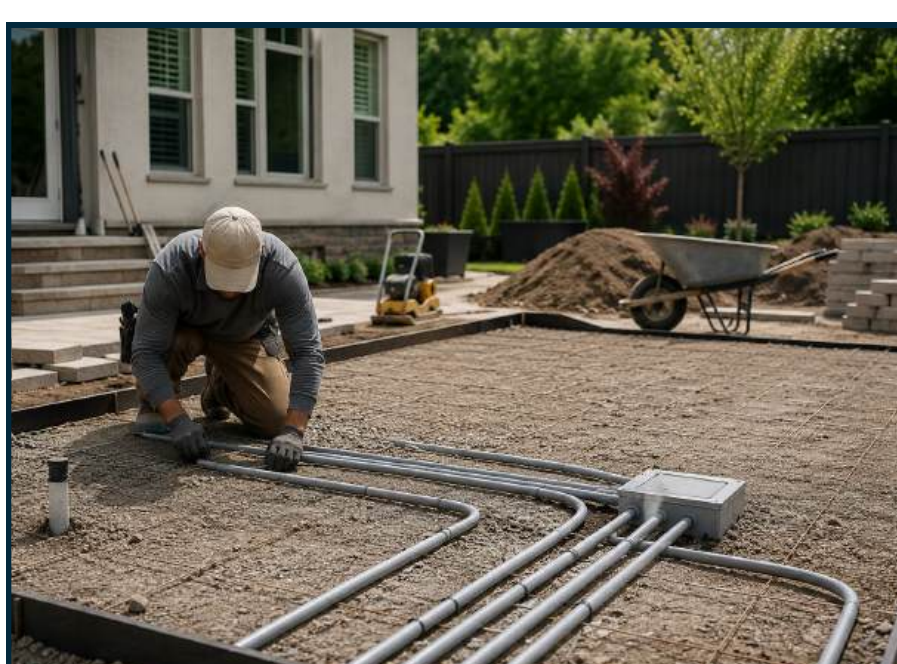


6. A New Patio Can Improve Curb Appeal and Property Value
